Overview of feed additives

- EU Regulation 1831/2003 controls the use of additives in animal nutrition.
- Feed additives are substances, micro-organisms or preparations, other than feed materials or premixtures, that are intentionally added to feed or water in order to perform a range of functions.
- Technological, sensory, nutritional or zootechnical function.



Recent changes

- New additive group for mycotoxin binders.
- Commission Regulation on the status of certain feed products.
- Guidelines to determine the status of a feed product.
- Re-assessment and re-authorisation of many feed additives.
- Expected withdrawal of authorisation of orphan feed additives.
- Changes to the EU Register of Feed Additives.



Creation of a new group of feed additives

 Commission Regulation 386/2009 established a new functional group of feed additives:


'substances for reduction of the contamination of feed by mycotoxins: substances that can suppress or reduce the absorption, promote the excretion of mycotoxins or modify their mode of action.' e.g. clays or microorganisms

 No authorised additives in this group yet, but applications have been submitted.



Commission Regulation on the status of certain feed products

- Commission Regulation 892/2010 provides an opinion on the status of certain feed products.
- •These products may show additive, veterinary medicinal or feed material properties.
- Promote consistent opinions on these products throughout the EU





Guidelines to determine the status of a product

- Guidelines for the distinction between feed materials, feed additives, biocidal products and veterinary medicines.
- Criteria to allow distinction between the categories.
- A product can only be placed within one of these categories.




Re-assessment and re-authorisation of feed additives

- Requirement for additives authorised under 70/524/EEC to be re-assessed and re-authorised after November 2010.
- Applications now submitted to the Commission and then considered by EFSA.
- 1250 additives subject to re-assessment.
- Possible changes to conditions of authorisation.
- Does the Committee have any views on the reauthorisation of any particular feed additives?



Withdrawal of authorisation of orphan additives

- Additives that were not supported with applications for re-authorisation are known as 'orphan additives' and will be withdrawn from the market.
- 1578 additives orphaned in the re-authorisation process.





Changes to the EU Register of Feed Additives

- Now in two separate annexes:
- Annex I list of authorised feed additives
- Annex II list of orphaned additives to be removed from the Register.





The use of feed additives in water

- In December 2010, EFSA produced a self-tasked
 Opinion on the use of feed additives in water.
- Discussed at the March meeting of SCoFCAH Animal
 Nutrition Section.
- MSs and the Commission decided that additives in water considered on a <u>case by case</u> basis.
- Applications for re-authorisation that include use in water will be prioritised.
